HOW TO USE THIS PROGRAM PATHWAY

Read through each year; investigate what appeals to you here and in other Program Pathways that apply to you. Note that this Pathway is only a suggestion. **For the most up to date information, please check the UTSC Calendar.**

YEAR 1 (0 - 3.5 Credits)

YEAR 2 (4 - 8.5 Credits)

YEAR 4 or FINAL YEAR (14 - 20 Credits)

CHOOSE YOUR COURSES WISELY

- 1.0 credit as follows: FREA01H3, FREA02H3. French Immersion/Francophone students will start at either FREB01H3 or FREC01H3. If you have advanced proficiency, please contact the Associate Chair for placement.
- Explore different kinds of courses; this will also help with fulfilling breadth requirements and electives.

- 1.0 credit as follows: FREB01H3, FREB02H3.
- 2.0 credits in French Linguistics and 1.5 credits in Culture and 1.0 credit in French Literature (see UTSC Calendar for course lists) - taken in year 2 to 4 depending on course level.
- 1.0 credit as follows: FREB50H3, FREB35H3 and 2.0 additional credits in Literature (see UTSC Calendar for course lists).

- 1.0 credit as follows: FREC01H3, FREC02H3.
- 1.5 credits in French courses not already taken (see UTSC Calendar for course lists).
- Continue to fulfill the Linguistic, Culture, and Literature requirements outlined in year 2.
- Use Degree Explorer to ensure you are on track with your degree.

- 1.0 credit as follows: FRED01H3, FRED06H3.
- Continue to fulfill the requirements listed in year 2/3 if necessary.
- Use Degree Explorer to ensure you are on track to graduate.
- Register your "Intent to Graduate" on ACORN by the deadline.

DEVELOP YOUR ACADEMIC & RESEARCH SKILLS

- Schedule an appointment with your Program Librarian for in-depth research assistance with your assignments.
- Get writing support at the CTL Writing Centre.

- Further develop your general academic skills by attending workshops offered by the Academic Advising & Career Centre (AA&CC) and Centre for Teaching & Learning (CTL).

- Consider competing for the UTSC Library Undergraduate Research Prize or Poster Forum.

- Apply for an Academic Travel Fund through Department of Student Life (DSL) to research, present at a conference, or engage with the international academic community.

APPLY THEORY TO PRACTICE

- Attend the UTSC Faculty Mix & Mingle Fair to connect with professors and learn more about their specialties.
- Start building your Co-Curricular Record (CCR) and search for Experiential Learning opportunities.

- Consider participating in the Explore Program, the 5-week French Language Bursary program.
- Consider enrolling in FREC10H3, a service learning course that combines academic learning with hands-on learning within the community.

- Apply for a Summer Abroad in France Tours or an Exchange program in France, Belgium or Switzerland; visit ISC for details.
- Build on your skills and knowledge through relevant events offered through your department, student groups, DSL and the AA&CC.

- Attend the Summer & Full-time Job Fair in January to meet with potential employers looking to hire students for summer and full-time positions relevant to your field.

BECOME AN ENGAGED CITIZEN (LOCALLY & GLOBALLY)

- Get involved with the French Department Student Association (FDSA); also explore other relevant student clubs and activities on campus.
- Volunteer in DSL's Alternative Reading Week volunteer program to gain experience and knowledge about social change and community development.

- Explore volunteer opportunities with local organizations to get involved in the Francophone community.
- Practice and improve your French language skills through Global Learning opportunities such as a Summer Abroad through the International Student Centre (ISC).

- Run for an elected position in the French Department Student Association (FDSA).
- Volunteer with DSL as a First Year Peer Advisor.

- Participate in the AA&CC's Partners in Leadership program to learn and network with an alumni mentor about transitioning to work or further education.

PLAN FOR YOUR FUTURE CAREER

- Volunteer with organizations to explore your interests; check listings on CLNx.
- Attend the UTSC Get Experience Fair in September and register with SCSU's Volunteer Network Program to explore opportunities.

- Gain experience by applying for a summer, part-time or Work Study position via CLNx.
- Considering grad school? Speak to professors and advisors early so you are on track.
- Explore careers through the AA&CC's Job Shadowing and In The Field programs.

- Plan a career path with a staff member at the AA&CC.
- Check CLNx for networking events and employer information sessions to attend.
- Attend the "Graduate & Professional School Fair" in September.

- Attend the AA&CC's Get Hired job search conference in April/May.
- Attend a Jobs for Grads orientation for a job search "crash course" and for access to full-time job listings.
- Get your Personal Statement for grad school reviewed in the AA&CC.
