#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course will expand upon contemporary issues surrounding digital photography and photography as a whole. We will explore these ideas through a series of projects and online workshops. We will spend a lot of time looking at photographic projects by the Masters of the medium as well as consider some of the new voices making work internationally today. We will have three main projects based on themes discussed during online group conversations, with supplemental resources accessible through Quercus. In addition to the projects there will be assigned readings that accompany the professor's lectures to support the understanding of contemporary issues in photography. The process of thinking, reading, and writing about photography will inform the practice of making photographs.

## GOALS AND OBJECTIVES FOR THIS COURSE

• Learn advanced technique in digital photography & Photoshop manipulation

- Learn to produce the photographs that demonstrate a strong understanding of composition and visual language
- Learn to use an advanced lighting system with a focus on mixed lighting scenarios
- Develop knowledge of strategies used by photographers to clearly and effectively express their vision, this includes different methodologies of engaging with the subject, and basic understanding of the use of multiple images, their sequences and scale.
- Demonstrate an understanding of different genres of Photography and the theoretical framework that surround them.
- Develop techniques for research to expand concepts and push the boundaries of one's own practice

#### **COURSE EXPECTATIONS**

- Each student is expected to contribute to the class community by logging into the videoconference, being actively involved in-group discussions, in-class activities, and reviewing the links and videos in advance of each class.
- Students must be prepared for and actively involved in making their artwork at home.
- Students must spend adequate amounts of time outside of class working on and completing projects for this course.
- Students are expected to produce work at a quantity, quality and ambition appropriate for an intermediate university arts course.

## **REQUIRED MATERIALS and EQUIPMENT**

Students will be required to make professional – quality, digital images. Depending on your access to equipment this may be either the use of a DSLR or a simple cell phone. The work that you put into each project from the planning stages to the lighting, shooting and editing will show your dedication and determine the quality of your work. You will not be marked on the quality of the equipment that you use for making the projects for this class.

For students who have access to the UTSC campus: We are currently working on a plan to be able to offer a limited number of cameras and lights to be signed out to students. If you are interested in borrowing equipment please make sure that you speak with me in the first week of class.

#### Late assignments

#### CRITIQUES AND EVALUATIONS

Critical discussion is an important component of this class. Be prepared to speak clearly and convincingly about your work and your thought process during critiques. You will also be expected to look carefully, question and comment intelligently on the work of your peers.

Critiques are opportunities for you to get feedback about the conceptual and technical aspects of your projects. You should consider them as valuable occasions to assess whether your work is clear and interesting to an audience and as a tool, to help you develop your work. It is your responsibility to think critically about the comments and make your own choices about how you want the work to be realized.

The work you present in critiques must be well-constructed and properly installed (wall works must be hung; floor works must be installed on clean, unobstructed floors; objects must be displayed on appropriate platforms. Work for critiques must be installed prior to the beginning of class; otherwise it will be considered late and will also have an impact on your participation grade. Everyone is expected to present assignments on the due date. (See above for late deductions.)
