Webb Keane is the George Herbert Mead Collegiate Professor of Anthropology at the University of Michigan. His most recent book, *Ethical Life: Its Natural and Social Histories* (2015), was published by Princeton University Press. He is also the author of *Christian Moderns: Freedom and Fetish in the Mission Encounter* (2007) and *Signs of Recognition: Powers and Hazards of Representation in an Indonesian Society* (1997), based on fieldwork in Indonesia. His scholarship covers a range of topics in social and cultural theory and the philosophical foundations of social thought and the human sciences. In particular, he is interested in semiotics and language; material culture; gift exchange, commodities, and money; religion, morality, and ethics; and media and public cultures.
