Letter of Intent

Requirements

- 1-2 pages
- Indicate your research interests
- Prospective research agenda
- Why the program is right for you (identify potential supervisors)
- Indicate your experience and how you're well-suited for the program

- There's a formula! Get a sample letter from a graduate student in that program
- Have multiple people read your statement
- Start **early**! 3-4 months ahead
- State names/connections to specific professors you want to work with
 - Networking with professors you want to work with beforehand is helpful!

Statement of interest

My name is and I am enthusiastic about your MA program in Sociology as the ideal next step in my sociological training and pursuits. My excellent preparation at the University of British Columbia, where I attained Dean's List standing, research assistantship at the University of Toronto, and work experience as an assistant post-graduation, are all indicators of my academic promise.

While pursuing a double major in Sociology and Psychology at UBC, I collaborated with and was a research assistant to Dr. Judith Taylor. With this project, I received training in conducting interviews with frontline workers and began my career in visual sociology, photographing participants. Following this experience, I created a self-directed course under the supervision of Dr. Sean Lauer, continuing my exploration of the sociological literature on sexual assault and approaches to visual sociology. These undertakings and my close working relationship with both researchers, whom I highly admire, were crucial in my decision to continue onto graduate level work.

I am most interested in research at the intersection of gender, culture, and criminal legal studies. My generation has been a part of pivotal shifts in thinking about sexual autonomy and the expansiveness of identity. I have grown up in an era where consent is a complex nuanced concept and where important ideas of bodily integrity have begun to gain cultural traction. For such reasons, I am both excited and eager to be a part of a scholarship that is thinking in novel ways about identity and interrelation. I hope to focus my master's research on shifting understandings of sexual consent in the Canadian context. Frameworks I hope to explore include script theory (Gagnon and Simon's, 1986), dramaturgy (Goffman, 1959), gender performativity (Butler, 1990), as well as content and discourse analysis.

The high degree of expertise and range of experience in the UofT Sociology department is my primary reason for applying. Having the opportunity to learn from your researchers will facilitate my important sociological questions, deepening their theoretical base, and strengthening my methodological approach. Further, I believe this program will prepare me accordingly for my goal of attaining a PhD in Sociology, Dr. Taylor, who has agreed to be my supervisor, will enhance my research by strongly anchoring it in feminist perspectives of sexual assault. Additionally, her extensive experience with feminist and community activism will introduce me to the important communities thinking critically on how to elaborate social consent definitions and understandings. Dr. Fields' research with high school and middle school communities is incredibly inspiring and hopeful for the direction I hope to take in terms of my preferred population. Her expertise would surely root my examination of consent within the sexual health education literature and its intersection with government legislation. Finally, Dr. Hannah-Moffat's knowledge and research on risk and gender within the court system would help focus my interests concerning the intersection / divergence of law-enforcement in relation to emerging cultural consent discourses. I would be honoured to learn under her guidance.

The community of graduate students currently working in the area of gender is another crucial draw I have to this program. The diverging approaches and experience of this cohort would greatly enhance my research pursuits. Reciprocally, my training experience and commitments would bring value to this discipline, helping push critical discussion forward

Early on in my undergraduate studies, I took on a degree in jazz performance in addition to my B.A. in social sciences. This came as no surprise to my family, who often jokes that I never outgrew my childhood proclivities to barrage people with both an impressive amount of 'why's and invitations to my one-woman shows. Unexpected, however, were the social experiences my music degree entailed. I distinctly remember questioning a history instructor as to why all but two of over two hundred jazz musicians we'd surveyed were male; 'women,' he responded, 'just weren't as influential.' As a female performer in jazz' hypermasculine landscape, I began to wonder what 'influence' truly was and how it factored into why there were still so few of me.

In turn, sociology allowed me to unpack my experience through the understanding that certain identities and forms of knowledge are valued more than others. Critical perspectives such as Adorno, Durkheim, Bourdieu, Harding, and Becker's fostered my understanding of both historical and contemporary mechanisms of social inequality and stratification related to gender, race, and class in the contexts of artistic and cultural production. I consequently developed a keen interest in researching the unequal distribution of power and labour in such contexts, grounding myself in standpoints issuing from science and technology studies as well as the sociology of knowledge, culture, work, gender, and health. In this vein, I have focused on topics such as music's ties to health, collaborative and improvised art scenes, work in creative industries, colonialism and Indigenous artistry, and social constructionism in the classification of music. In hopes that I be admitted, I have taken a gap year to conduct preliminary work for a mixed methods major research paper investigating the understudied effects of gender on enrollment and differential experiences in Canadian jazz music education. Ultimately, I aim to harness sociology's robust methodological and theoretical traditions to expand knowledge about artistic and cultural contexts as well as inform policy and practices that affect change within them.

With this in mind, I have undertaken academic, professional and extracurricular pursuits specifically geared toward honing my independent research and writing skills. I have extensively researched and worked on art, culture and health in the context of coursework, personal ethnographic projects, and research assistantships for various large and small scale initiatives. As a result, I have cultivated a strong competency in qualitative inquiry and research design, and developed a strong sense of orientation in the research process. Perpetuating this growth as well as the continued and enriched opportunity to keep doing what I love-reading, writing, and building relationships with my peers and mentors—greatly motivates my application to UofT's MA program. Its department's research areas in the sociology of culture, gender, social networks, and work are greatly relevant to my own research orientations, and my correspondences with various faculty members have demonstrated that my project ideas and interests would find considerable support. Namely, in light of Dr. Jooyoung Lee, Dr. Vanina Leschziner and Dr. Daniel Silver's work on culture and art, as well as Dr. Sharla Alegria, Dr. Judith Taylor, Dr. Ann Mullen's approaches to investigating inequality in the production of knowledge and culture. These scholars' methodological foci would also allow me to hone my current research abilities and to diversify my skillset by furthering my engagement with theoretical and quantitative approaches. My admittance would therefore be highly conducive to building the knowledge, skills, and networks crucial to achieving my ultimate goal of undertaking doctoral studies and career in academia.

My established interests and profile as a diligent, highly motivated student with extensive experience in academic, research, and cross-disciplinary contexts make me an ideal MA candidate. I am confident that UofT's MA program will best foster my ability to pursue my specific interests, and look forward to the opportunity to leverage my penchant for 'why's so as to produce new sociological knowledge and effectively apply it to current social problems.

- 10-25 pages
 - Page count depends on program
- Usually 1 longer paper (ie: an honours thesis)
- Usually required to be the solo author

- Use course papers/ assignments in line with your research interests
- Work you are proud of!
- If you don't have a single paper that's 10-25 pages you can include 2+ shorter papers
- Go over/ edit/ rework the papers you are submitting!
- Have other folks read and make suggestions!

Reference Letters



Requirements

- 2-3 depending on program
- Academic references
- Add their contact information in the application portal
- Depending on the program, may have certain requirements
 - Some want only referees with PhDs (not grad instrs.)
 - Some want those who have worked with you in closely

- Ask your referees at least 1 month before the deadline (up to 2 months is best)
- Choose referees who can speak to your work and abilities well
- Make a spreadsheet for your referee to assist them in managing deadlines and requirements
- Nudge!

Summary

- Seek mentors and reviewers for application materials (use templates from former applicants, ask TAs/profs for feedback on letter of intent).
- Start early! It takes time to compile, edit, and collect everything, especially reference letters.
- Understand funding options: guarantees, risks, and cost of living!
- Do your research on programs! Talk to current graduate students, organize application deadlines and requirements, ask your mentors
- This process can be intimidating, but don't sell yourself short!
