LECTURER - INORGANIC CHEMISTRY

The Department of Physical and Environmental Sciences at the University of Toronto Scarborough invites applications for a full-time teaching-stream position at the rank of Lecturer in Inorganic Chemistry to begin July 1, 2011. In the fifth year of service, Lecturers will be reviewed and a recommendation made with respect to promotion to a continuing position at the rank of Senior Lecturer. We are inviting candidates with a strong commitment to undergraduate education in both the lecture and lab settings to apply. Graduate school-level experience in inorganic is essential. Experience in physical chemistry is a highly desired asset.

The successful candidate will have a Ph.D. in chemistry or a closely related field. Experience in lecturing and/or coordinating laboratories at the university level is an asset. The applicant will be responsible for effectively teaching and coordinating undergraduate inorganic and physical chemistry courses with all of the attendant organizational issues of lecture preparation and delivery, laboratory preparation and delivery including updating and printing the course lab manual, supervision of and liaison with laboratory demonstrators, setting, supervision and marking of exams, final course marks, record-keeping, course evaluations, and so forth.

Applications will be accepted until January 15, 2011. Applicants are asked to send a letter of application including a full curriculum vitae, a concise plan for future teaching directions, and a teaching dossier that outlines the candidate's teaching experience, subject areas of teaching expertise, and goals for course delivery and curriculum development. Applicants should arrange for three persons to provide a letter of reference. All application materials must be received by the application deadline.

The University of Toronto is strongly committed to diversity within its community and especially welcomes applications from visible minority group members, women, aboriginal persons, persons with disabilities, members of sexual minority groups, and others who may contribute to the further diversification of ideas. All qualified candidates are encouraged to apply; however, Canadians and permanent residents of Canada will be given priority.
