

Clinical Psychology Graduate Training at the University of Toronto

The Graduate Program in Counselling and Clinical Psychology is a tri-campus M.A. and Ph.D. degree program at the University of Toronto housed across two Departments: The Graduate Department of Psychological Clinical Science (GD-PCS) at the University of Toronto Scarborough (UTSC) and the Department of Applied Psychology and Human Development at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE).

Each Department offers one field of study:

Clinical Psychology at UTSC

Clinical and Counselling Psychology at OISE

Each field is distinguished by the faculty research and clinical specializations offered.

Students benefit from having access to faculty and resources across the Departments and campuses. Students also benefit from strong connections to the University of Toronto affiliated hospital research network, providing access to training sites, patient populations, and state-of-the-art facilities and equipment.

- Coursework in clinical psychology, affiliated content domains, research design, statistics and other relevant topics

- Clinical practica in approved practice settings supervised by registered Clinical Psychologists
- Original research theses related to Clinical Psychology are conducted for the MA and PhD degrees

- PhD Comprehensive Examination consisting of a clinical competency oral component and a written grant proposal component
- Predoctoral clinical internship at a CPA - or American Psychological Association - accredited clinical setting

UTSC Clinical Psychology

Clinical Psychology at UTSC adheres to the clinical science model of training. The central tenet of the clinical science model of training is that scientific method and evidence are the core of clinical psychology. We follow a generalist model of training, with a primary focus on adults. Our program also maintains that clinical scientists are best trained through a mentorship model. We provide instruction in psychopathology, assessment and intervention.

Our students receive a guaranteed minimum funding package of \$21,000 plus tuition and incidental fees for two years of the MA program and four years of the PhD program. Beyond the guaranteed minimum funding package, prospective and current students are highly encouraged to apply for all external funding sources for which they are eligible.

MA Admission Requirements

- A four-year bachelor's degree (or its equivalent) from a recognized University
- At least an A - (or first class standing) in the final two years of undergraduate study
- At least 4.0 to 6.0 full course equivalents (or 8 to 12 semester courses) in psychology, including statistics and some laboratory research experience.
- Two academic letters of reference
- A personal statement
- A curriculum vitae

The requirements outlined above are for program entry at the MA level. Prospective students who already have an existing master's degree in Clinical Psychology may consider admissibility under the requirements of the PhD program. Please consult our website for details.

Note: Our program is intended to meet the registration requirements of the College of Psychologists of Ontario (CPO) at the doctoral level. For information about CPO's registration requirements, applicants are encouraged to contact the College directly.

When to Apply

There is only one admission cycle every year, with a September program start date. The application and supporting documentation are generally due in December. Interviews normally take place early in the year and offers of admission are made by April.
